

world loyalties to any particular group certainly seem a little more liquid than in the past. I began to wonder if the denomination as an institution was on its way out. To be honest, perhaps it is; but I know that at the very least it will be greatly overhauled in the coming years whether there is a restructure or not. But my prayer is that there continues to be a link to the history and legacy of the American Baptist Churches USA in the years to come. It is our history that has provided for us a sense of continuity during time of great turmoil. It has been a rock to cling to and a starting point for our decision making.

Take Evergreen for example. When faced with the reality of a split between two groups within the region, we took on designing a new region. Not wanting the split and reasons for the split to

be our only reason to be a region, we asked what else was there. In the face of this question, we looked to our history and identity as Baptists. ABC boasts the most ethnically diverse denomination in the US. This claim drove us to look at our multi-cultural make up which led us to realize that there was an opportunity to create an equitable system. It was a natural move because valuing our diversity is part of our DNA. It has been our history and it is a value that drives us. We are called the *Evergreen Association* because we wanted to be deliberate in harkening to our Baptist roots of free association based not on geography or even theology but on mission and ministry. When seeking to create a critical mass of churches, it was our identity as American Baptists that was the starting point.

There is a lot to be said for churches being independent and

unaffiliated with a national body. It brings with it a certain kind of flexibility and pliability. Yet what is forfeited is the stability that comes from a connection to concrete history and a sense of identity. I am driven first by my affirmation of Christ as personal savior. However, I am next identified with the values and history of this group called American Baptists and that identity has served to light the way over and over. I will continue to pray for the denomination in the hopes that there will be throughout this next era, an American Baptist Churches USA.

## BIENNIAL CORNER



One of the goals of the Evergreen Leadership Retreat is to have 500 conversations at the Biennial about Evergreen. One of the important aspects of that is that *we need to know if you are planning to be at the biennial, so we might ask your help at our booth in the Missions Fair*. But whether you are at the booth or not, what might you say to someone who discovers you are from Evergreen Association. Here are some “talking points”.

⇒ Evergreen is unique because of our organization by ethnic cau-

cuses (rather than geography).

- ⇒ Evergreen is unique because of our decision making by consensus.
- ⇒ The above points mean that in our Region people of color feel totally a part of the decision making process and the Euro-caucus is learning better what it means to work in a multi-cultural setting.
- ⇒ We are discovering new things about each other in our work and ministry.
- ⇒ We chose the name Association because we value relationship.

- ⇒ Local churches are attempting to do some of their work by consensus, thus building stronger church bodies, as members feel that they have been heard.
- ⇒ Our Region is geographically “scattered”, extending from Palmer Alaska to Costa Mesa California (Everyone is welcome to a listing of our Region Churches).

This should help you get started. I hope you can join us in Pasadena and help us have our 500 conversations. More about the biennial next newsletter.

## Paddle to Suquamish/Tribal Canoe Journey 2009



Native Canoe Journey 2009 will culminate in the Kitsap Peninsula region of Washington State, with the Suquamish Tribe hosting canoe journey ceremonial events, August 3—8, 2009 beginning with *canoe protocol* on August 3rd

This year is the 20 year anniversary of Paddle to Seattle; the first modern-day Native Canoe Journeys. There were no known organized traditional-styled intertribal canoe journeys since the 1800's.

The 1989 Paddle to Seattle involved 9 canoes from Washington Coastal Tribes and British Columbia paddling

from Suquamish to Seattle. These journeys have become annual events, known by many as “Tribal Journeys”.

## Keeping the Leadership Accountable

During our January Evergreen Leaders Retreat, we heard a presentation about the Intercultural Development Inventory (our next Building Bridges Plenary?). We also “guessed” what our collective Inventories revealed. Each person was asked to complete a 50-question Inventory prior to the retreat. What we discovered, is that we all rated ourselves a bit more “developed”

than we actually scored. (Most other groups do this, too).

Because of the resulting conversation we agreed as Evergreen Leaders to strive to do three things:

1. Consistently and more intentionally use “mutual invitation” as we do our work, at all levels.
2. Use more intentionally the Levels of Consensus tool particularly when we report our

work, so that we have a sense of where each other (individually or corporately) is on the particular concern before the body.

3. To do a much better job of evaluation. (This is where we need everyone’s help, as evaluation instruments are too often “missing” in our work together.) In particular the leadership group suggested we ask the question regularly: what did you learn about your iceberg?



## Youth Council Proposal (Coming Before the Association Board April 25th)

In an effort to foster young leaders and to bring up the next generation in the “Evergreen Way”, the Executive Committee proposes the following:

1. A council comprised of two youth from each caucus will be formed with the mandate to
  - a. Foster relationships between young people within Evergreen through youth activities and op-

- portunities for connection, and
  - b. Bring a youth voice into the leadership of the Evergreen Association Board.
2. The youth will be assigned an adult advisor who will help them form into a leadership team.
3. The youth will be a part of the Association Board and Caucus meetings playing a leader-

ship role and representing the youth of our churches.

4. This effort will be funded through the caucuses who will be encouraged to dedicate a portion of their budget to underwriting youth activities.

## Canoe Journey Proposal (Coming Before the Association Board April 25th)

As our neighbors gather this coming August 2009 by paddling from their homes to the home of the Suquamish Tribe, we want to join in with others in encouraging them in their efforts to renew their tribal heritages and traditions. In the spirit of the 1988 and 1998 Ecumenical Apologies to the Northwest

Tribes, we offer a letter of greeting and encouragement (text of the letter to be made available to Association Board members).

In addition, we [propose to] join with our United Methodist brothers and sisters in Christ who are supporting this particular journey by making the lands and facilities of <sup>1</sup>Camp India-

nola, available to the tribes for a landing site and hospitality during August 3-8, 2009, with a gift of \$500 from our program budget.

<sup>1</sup>There is a cost in terms of loss of revenue to Camp Indianola of \$20,000 for this week. They are offering landing site and housing for 250 people gratis to the Tribe. This isn't much, but it does say to our Ecumenical partners that

## Global Day of Prayer for Burma

Like many churches around the world, Seattle's Japanese Baptist Church observed March 8, 2009, as the 13th annual Global Day of Prayer for Burma. During worship that morning, in preparation for a special time of prayer, the congregation was blessed with a musical selection presented by a group from the Washington Burmese Fellowship, which meets in Kent. Led on the guitar by their pastor, Joshua Lian, the group sang about the peace of God, which they long for in their individual lives and in that of their native land.

It was fitting that on the same day during the Sunday School hour, JBC's Shawnda Fukano taught the first session of a class for adult English language learners, all from Burma. Shawnda, who teaches such classes for children in public

school, has been eager to find a way to teach some at JBC and offered to do so for our new friends. After the session, one member expressed appreciation for this class, which provided a close friendly setting for participants to ask questions without



embarrassment. The five adults who attend the class now regularly attend worship at JBC on Sunday mornings, though all of them also attend services conducted in Burmese in Kent in the evening.

Several of our Evergreen churches have become involved in assisting refugees

from Burma who are resettling in the Seattle area. Churches outside of Seattle are also offering space and providing resources for Burmese coming to their areas. For information about some possibilities your congregation may wish to consider, you are invited to contact Gail and Paul Aita of JBC, who have spoken at a number of our churches on this topic.
