Summer 2007 has been a time when the Japanese Baptist Church of Seattle has experienced partnership with International Ministries in a variety of ways. At the June 3rd joint worship service for JBC's Englishand Japanese-speaking congre-

gations, for example, the morning message at worship took the form of an interview (in both

languages) with Roberta Stephens, IM missionary to Japan and one of JBC's newer members. On June 10th, her last Sunday before returning to Japan after a year's home assignment, Roberta preached at the Nichigo (Japanese-language service).

On June 24th, after Roberta's departure, JBC was pleased that John and Tomoko

Armagost, also IM missionaries to Japan, along with two of their three children, were able to participate in the church's English worship service, having just arrived in the US for their year of home assignment. Along with youth

and young adults of the church
and members of its Christian

Education and Outreach Committees, the Armagosts joined in a time of special prayer for
Chris Nielsen, one of JBC's

newer members, who would soon be leaving for a summer mission experience in Japan through IM's volunteer office. The Armagosts will be based in Seattle during the coming year, and intend to make JBC their church home during this time to

the extent that their duties permit.

What is remarkable about JBC's relationship with Roberta Stephens and the Armagosts at this particular point in time is that all of them have been involved with

Chris's mission work. As

Roberta returns to Japan, her new assignment with IM has to do with deploying, training, and welcoming mission volunteers. So she was able to do some of this with Chris while she was still here in the US. And as it turned out, Chris will be serving primarily with the Nishi Okamoto Christ Church in Kobe, where John Armagost has been the pastor. Chris will even be living in the home where the Armagosts have lived. John and

Tomoko, therefore, were able to make connections for Chris with the church's present pastor, Rev. Akira Takahashi and others at the church.

But there is more. Not only is a continuing IM missionary (Roberta Stephens) now a member of JBC,

but a couple of continuing JBC members are soon to be commissioned as IM missionaries! Gordon and Lee Ann Hwang have been JBC's own missionar-

ies to Japan since 2005, when Lee Ann began teaching at the Soshin Girls' School in Yokohama. This spring, Gordon and Lee Ann were endorsed for appointment by IM, and they have since appointed members of their Missionary Partnership Team (MPT), including three JBC members. The Hwangs are returning to the US for a period of several weeks this summer. Plans are for them to be officially commissioned as IM missionaries at JBC on Sunday, August 26th, and for their MPT to receive its formal training from Ruthie Stevenson and Jim Bell of IM that afternoon!

Then there's the connection between Chris Nielsen and the Hwangs. As this article is being written, Chris Nielsen is in Yokohama, visiting with the Hwangs and engaging in English-language groups with students at the Soshin School.

This summer's unique connection of individuals on both sides of the Pacific is the result of relationships made and nurtured throughout the years. Two of JBC's former pastors, for example, Rev. Kunihiko Amano and Rev. Yoshihisa Sawano, are

Exhibition Center with the unveiling of the "120,000 Nikkei Voices of Gratitude" to the Northern/American Baptist Mission Societies was an especially emotional experience for me. The Nikkei (Japanese in America) people served by ABC Home and Women's Missionary Societies before WWII, during internment/ incarceration in the camps and after the camps, expressing "thank you", was a grand opening for the Biennial. The ministry of outreach through the Japanese Baptist Church of Seattle served not only Baptists, but the wider Nikkei communities.

The response of those who attended the opening or attended the exhibition later was very positive and appreciative. Many said that the exhibit "giving thanks" to ABC was the highlight of the Convention.

Yosh, thanks for lifting up the Nikkei appreciation for the missionaries who served their Lord and their denomination during difficult political and social times, especially at Minidoka Camp in Idaho. Also, a special thanks to Yosh's team—his wife, Sue; daughter, Linda; Brooks Andrews and wife Corean; and friends for the success of the exhibit—professionally done!

Then what a "treat" to have all parts of the programs being positive, inclusive, forward-looking, without even a note of dissent. (Maybe the good Lord interjected a bit of humor by leading the convention to be held at the Washington Convention Center where the accommodations could have been more "user friendly" leaving lots of room for fussing about housing and costs.)

The convention theme was "Arise and Shine", Isaiah 60:1. How JBC did "arise to shine" in presenting the exhibit and staffing it; and with Yosh Nakagawa being awarded the Jitsuo Morikawa Evangelism award!

And how Evergreen Association "arose and shone" with Greg Ledbetter, Shell Ridge Community Church, California, receiving the Rhoades Urban Ministry Award; Leslie Braxton and the New Beginnings Christian Fellowship, formed less than two years ago, receiving recognition for the African American Church with the highest increase in United Mission giving, as well as the aforementioned award to Yosh Naka-

gawa! Isn't it possible that God has called Evergreen to "Arise and Shine" "for such a time as this" Esther 4:14.

As I attended the worship services in the large hall and heard the music and the challenging messages from diverse ethnicities/races, ages, and personalities—what a voice God has in ABC/USA! currently serving as pastors in Japan, and they maintain contact with JBC. JBC's current Senior Minister, Dr. Paul Aita, made trips to Japan in 2004 and 2005 to visit the American Baptist missionaries there. His 2004 trip was made in conjunction with Stan Murray and Bob Santilli of IM, and included visits to Pastors Amano and Sawano and to IM missionaries:

the DeRolfs and the Davidsons in Yokohama, Roberta Stephens in Sendai, and the Armagosts in Kobe. The 2005 trip, in which Dr. Aita's wife Gail also took part, included time with the Hwangs in Yokohama, as well as participation in a retreat in the Kobe-area for missionary families attended by the Armagosts, the Hwangs, Roberta Stephens, and Carolyn Predmore. On various occasions, Judy De Rolf, Stan Murray,

John Armagost, and Dwight Davidson have each preached at JBC. One year, JBC men attended a retreat at Camp Burton on Vashon Island, near Seattle, at which John Armagost was the speaker.

JBC has truly been blessed by its relationship with International Ministries. The church is pleased to be in partnership with IM in the Lord's work.

Other Missionary News

Nancy and Stephen James have been endorsed for reappointment with International Ministries to serve in Haiti. In being reappointed, they will be jointly appointed by IM and the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship. The Haitian Baptist Convention is the inviting partner. James and her husband both do medical

work in different clinics throughout Haiti.

Note: The Jameses will open a clinic in Haiti and an offering will be received at the Annual Meeting to help equip the clinic.

Gordon and Lee Ann Hwang have been endorsed for joint appointment to missionary service through IM and the Japanese Baptist Church of Seattle, WA. The inviting partner is the Soshin Girls School, Yokohama in cooperation with the Japan Baptist Union. Hwang will work in after-school programs and teach a Bible class at Soshin Church, while his wife will work full-time as an English teacher at Soshin.

What a surprise it was to wake up and become so sick on the Sunday of the Biennial Convention! Since I'm generally a rather a healthy individual, it took awhile for it to sink in to me that I just wasn't feeling well enough to do what I needed to do. So early Sunday afternoon I called my oldest brother. Tom. He lives in Northern Virginia and the only time I was going to be able to see him was that he was scheduled to take me to the airport on Monday. The average compensation for pastors in Evergreen Association as of July 1, 2007 is \$46,683.

That figure includes salary and housing only, not other benefits.

Enclosed in this newsletter is a brochure that tells you about the distribution of the United Mission dollar. I hope it will encourage you to give more in 2008 to United Mission. 4% of the dollar goes to American Baptist Seminary of the West and 62.5% of the remainder will return to Evergreen in 2008.

Below are two graphs that illustrate how our churches are

participating in giving so far in 2007. We are 7.7% below our 2006 giving to United Mission YTD, and 1.5% less than our first 6 months 2006 ABMS (American Baptist Mission Support). I hope by the end of the year that all churches that gave last year, give this year and that all churches reach deep and increase their giving over last year.

Thanks for planning to do your part in 2008 and for doing your part in 2007!




