Pullman Baptist Church Approves Sale of Church Building and Grounds

Following is an edited version of a report by Rev. John Doty, Pastor of Pullman Baptist Church (PBC):

On Sunday morning June 17, 2007, the gathered members of Pullman Baptist Church voted unanimously to accept the full-price offer to sell the church building and grounds. During the past year discussions were increasingly focused on the sale as a possibility, with the idea of creating an endowment fund to support ministries in the future. The church was at a point of crisis in November-December, 2006 due to high heating bills and low income.

Now we are at a point, in essence, of being a "new church plant," with a supplementary basis of funding. We stand at the edge of the Red Sea, and are moving off the

Evergreen Seminarians

The Evergreen Association is one of several church bodies that sponsor the Institute of Ecumenical Theological Education (IETS) at Seattle University. Though Seattle U is a Jesuit school, its School of Theology and Ministry provides M.Div. and other degree programs for Protestant students through IETS, as well as for Catholic students through the parallel Institute of Catholic Theological Education (ICTS). As part of its ecumenical commitment, IETS asks each sponsoring denomination to assign a person to be its

familiar land of Egypt into the unfamiliar, led by God. Our community is 80% college students, faculty and staff, and therefore our target audience lies within those ranks. Our church body is a reflection of our community--college students, graduate students, non-traditional students, not the least of whom are my wife Vernetta and me.

Meanwhile, we are in a "preparing for the Exodus" mode—taking very little, only the most precious silverware and a few dishes, sound system, instruments, and the pastor's key parchments.

This is not a definitive or final report on what's going on at PBC. Actually Allegra Johnson, our moderator, took

notes at the meeting, including what I "really" said, and we are working together on the next steps of site selection, what we're keeping and leaving, setting up the endowment fund, breaking down how we'll spend the conservative percentage that we withdraw each year, and so on.

Meanwhile, we're looking at several fun events later in the summer. One includes a Youth (loosely defined) Retreat to the Doty' Chiwawa River cabin near Leavenworth, WA. July 27-29. There'll be some hiking, swimming at Lake Wenatchee, spiritual growth, wild games, and fellowship.

More later.

Denominational Formation Coordinator, serving as a liaison between the seminarians and their respective church bodies. An important part of this function involves introducing students to the resources and procedures of their denomination, especially (but not exclusively) related to ordination.

Dr. Paul Aita, senior minister of Japanese Baptist Church of Seattle, has served officially as the American Baptist Denominational Formation Coordinator for the Seattle U program for a number of years.

Having been asked unofficially to provide similar services for Evergreen students enrolled at Fuller Northwest, he has tried to relate to students from both schools and to include all of them in group events. One of the requirements for American Baptist seminarians at IETS is to participate in an annual one-day retreat together each year, and this has definitely been open to Fuller students as well. Other events for seminarians have been held in conjunction with Evergreen meetings, while

are made regarding my relationship to Japan.

Chuck put it directly and best when he asked early in our journey, "Dad, I don't understand how it is that you have never wanted to visit Japan? Was it because you married Dorothy who wasn't Japanese? Or was it because you grew up primarily in a white community?" He continued, "I know you went to Seattle because you were called as a Japanese American pastor by the Seattle Japanese Baptist Church. I know you identify with your Japanese background; but why not include Japan and her people?" Good questions. What was my thinking and feeling? The answer to these questions were very important to my family.

They, being only part Japanese, were excited to go to Japan. Jason was already there, thoroughly enjoying his work and the people. It was their idea and excitement that three generations would make this journey together. They had already accepted their Japaneseness, Japan, and the people. But, what of Dad and Grandpa?

All questions were resolved when Chuck asked me how did I feel that I was now actu-

ally in Japan, on Japanese soil, among thousands of people who look just like me?

When I said that I was comfortable and felt at home, he said, so did he and Andrew. Our spirits met! Three generations now one!

The other amazing part of the journey was how the Japanese saw me and accepted me. I learned through interpretation that they saw me as being Japanese, but my not speaking the language was seen and accepted that I was an Americanized

Japanese. What an understanding! I should not be surprised, for the Japanese understand clearly what it means to be westernized or Americanized. They can take anything from the outside and make it theirs, their way. Some day, I hope to find a book written by a Japanese author about the culture of Japan. My initial impression is that the culture of Japan is very complex while remaining at its center "Japanese."

What am I learning from my journey and the journey of three generations of Peter Koshis? I am learning that it is one thing to talk "ethnic" but another to "be" and to "feel" ethnic. I am more of a "whole" person now that I have emotionally bonded with my people, nation and land. I even

celebrated my 85th birthday there with Chuck, grandsons and friends. Wow!

Yes, in this Fourth of July month, I am proud to say that I am an American of Japanese parentage. I've had the privilege of walking the ground of former Koshi City and placed flowers at the Koshi cemetery, (thanks to a neighbor who shared flowers with us.)

I must say that the entire trip was a spiritual journey - even the train trips from Tokyo to Kyushu and back. Maybe this is where and when I was over-reacting, but for some reason I was filled with a sense of the spiritual. What was it, what is it? Maybe I will have an answer sometime later. It is an awesome country!

Thanks to Chuck, Andrew and Jason for a wonderful birthday gift - one not to be forgotten. Also, thanks for the cheering and support section: Chuck's family and my daughter Susan and family.

My appreciation to the Evergreen family for letting me share my journey. Thanks for your prayers and thoughts as we traveled.

AMERICAN BAPTIST CHURCHES' BIENNIAL/CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION, JUNE 29-JULY 2 IN WASHINGTON DC

VALLEY FORGE, PA

(ABNS) -- American Baptist Churches USA (ABCUSA) will celebrate the centennial of its founding at the Convention Center in Washington, D.C. starting at 7:00 p.m. on Friday, June 29. The event opened with an historic joint worship session that included thousands of Baptists—not only from ABCUSA, but also from the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship, Progressive National Baptists and the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention. The last two groups are based in Washington, D.C.. The rest of the weekend included a series of uplifting events and ended on a spiritual high at Monday's great commissioning evening service.

Pre-Biennial Events

Special training and education sessions preceded ABCUSA's Biennial/Centennial, including "Seeing the Children – Transforming the Church," at Howard University Divinity School in Washington, DC to discover creative ministry models that meet the needs of children living in poverty, especially important after Hurricane Katrina.

On Thursday there was special training for ministers led by nationally known Dr. Gil Rendle, author of *Behavioral Covenants in Congregations*, entitled: "Telling a better story: shaping the hopes and fears of the people."

100 Years of Living and Loving

The highlight of the three-day event was the celebration of the denomination's 100th anniversary. American Baptist Churches of the USA (ABCUSA) is a uniquely diverse gathering of believers that cuts across all of societies' groups.
